STAY ON TOP OF IRONBRIDGE COMMUNITY RULES & REGULATIONS

PET OWNERS

Concern has been expressed by some of our Ironbridge neighbors about the number of dogs offleash throughout the community and the risks involved. There are worries about out-of-control dogs and that at some point a severe injury/event is going to occur because someone chooses to ignore keeping their dog on a leash. <u>The Ironbridge Rules and Regulations</u> (revised June 14, 2019), #5 a & b:

a. Pet owners are required to keep pets on leashes at all times. Pet owners are required to pick up their animal waste at all times.

b. There is a maximum of two dogs permitted at each home. Violations of this rule may result in a daily fine.

Let's keep our community, our neighbors, and our dogs safe. Please keep your dog on a leash when walking throughout your Ironbridge neighborhood.





FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Finance Committee continues to work on improving and clarifying our financial statements and policies:

- 1. The updated **Policy and Procedures for Investment of Reserve Funds** is now posted on the Ironbridge POA website. Please review it to know how the Board will be guided to use and protect reserve funds.
- 2. The "AUP" financial audit was forwarded to residents on 3/20/2023 via email. Based on the findings by an independent CPA firm, the Finance Committee concluded there are material

weaknesses in the procedures conducted by IMM on behalf of the association. These fall in the areas of financial statements and use of reserve funds. A plan will be initiated to improve the quality of statements, and provide more clarity regarding how reserve funds are used.

- 3. A draft version of the 2022 Financial Statements has been provided by IMM. The finance committee is reviewing the results and hope to have a final version to the Board.
- 4. <u>Collection policies</u> are updated and in force. Please be mindful to pay dues on time, as this affects our ability to pay POA expenses and manage our operations more effectively.

A snow removal policy is in the works and will be shared with the community for your input.

The next Finance Committee meeting is scheduled for April 5th, 2023.

RIVER COMMITTEE



Our **Roaring Fork River** is one of 11 rivers within Colorado that has been designated as a "Gold Medal" water. What this means is that the Colorado Parks and Wildlife have designated it as such due to its consistency in producing trout standing stock of at least 60 pounds per acre and produces an average of at least 12 "quality trout" (14+ inches) per acre. Gold Medal water designation can only be applied to waters that are accessible for fishing by the general angling public. River segments must be at least 2 miles in length and lakes must be a minimum of 50 acres. Currently, 11 different rivers and three lakes account for nearly 325 miles of Colorado's Gold Medal waters.

The portion of the Roaring Fork River that is considered a Gold Medal Water begins at the confluence with the Fryingpan River and Roaring Fork River and continues for 22 miles until the Roaring Fork joins the Colorado River in Glenwood Springs. Typically, swift currents make float fishing preferable for many anglers, but there is wade fishing access surrounding boat ramps at the **Bob Terrell State Wildlife Area** near Carbondale and the **Sam Caudill/West Bank SWA** upstream of Glenwood Springs, and small pockets within the town itself. Many hardy brown and rainbow trout can be found in this stretch, along with mountain whitefish.

Colorado Gold Medal Waters provide great spots to catch healthy and large trout. The Roaring

Fork River has some special fishing regulations and rules for different sections of the river including regulations on catch and release areas, use of flies and lures, fish size, and other rules/guidelines that can be found on the Colorado Park & Wildlife website

Most anglers agree that the months of March and July offer up the best fishing of the year. The low, clear flows of late winter and early spring combined with the first mayfly hatches of the year give float fishermen a chance to catch the giants that hide out on the bottom of the river throughout most of the year. Once the high flows subside and the water regains its clarity, bugs begin to hatch, and fly fishermen return to the river's edge. Late June and early July usually mark the beginning of the Fork's fly-fishing season and this is when the epic Green Drake hatch starts. Both float fishermen and wade fishermen can participate in the Green Drake hatch, but because much of the Roaring Fork flows over private property, fishing access is limited for walk-in anglers. As summer progresses, flows drop significantly, and water temperatures on the lower stretches of the river rise. August and even early September can bring difficult fishing down low, forcing anglers to share the limited access on the upper and middle sections of the river. It is always a good idea to carry a thermometer while you fish and to keep your boat, feet, and flies out of water warmer than about 68 degrees Fahrenheit.

RESIDENT MEMBER AGREEMENT COMMITTEE (RMA)

The RMA Committee is waiting to hear back from the Club and their lawyers on the counter proposal that was sent to them recently. We are hopeful to hear something soon and keep moving forward. Come to any of our meetings we have to learn more.



We are very fortunate to live in this beautiful valley, but as the area grows, we must learn to adapt. Some of our neighbors have reported being concerned about suspicious activities and unfamiliar faces in our neighborhood. By taking a few precautions, we can all work together to establish a safe and secure community.

Here are 7 Simple Neighborhood Safety Tips to help our community stay safe year-round.

(1) Get to Know Your Neighbors and Communicate Often

Always get to know your neighbors. Don't just meet them but really try to get to know them and exchange phone numbers. Have a way to reach your neighbors if they're gone and something is amiss in the neighborhood.

It is also helpful if you know who is at home during the day and if any neighbors work during the night. Are their kids around? What ages? These tidbits provide information that will alert you if something seems amiss. Communication is a big factor in safety.

(2) Enhance Your Home's Security

Always keep your doors locked and keep spare keys with a trusted neighbor or family member instead of under the doormat or near your home. Set timers on lights when you're away from home, so it appears to be occupied.

Invest in a home security system, a doorbell camera like RING, or a combination video/alarm system. Doors and windows with alarms are a crime deterrent and cameras allow you to capture any mischief in real-time. Not only can you see who is on your property, but you can also typically watch for anything that doesn't seem right within a couple of hundred feet of your home.

(3) Keep Your Neighborhood and Property Clean

Keep your home clean and orderly and encourage your neighbors to do the same. A neighborhood with mowed lawns, nice landscaping, and nicely painted homes looks like someone is home and it's cared for, which can help deter crime. If you're away, make sure someone mows your yard, shovels the driveway, and brings in any newspapers, packages, or mail.

(4) Make it Less Appealing to Steal

Keep your blinds closed at night so people can't see your belongings, such as a big-screen TV, appliances, or other technology. Also, keep your windows closed when you're out during the day and at night. DO NOT leave valuables in plain sight in vehicles. Keep vehicles locked and when you can, in your garage.

(5) Don't Announce When You're Away on Social Media

In a Safewise study, 60% of the burglary victims said they were active on social media about when they were away. Posting night-out plans with location tags or live beach shots from vacation is a very bad idea. You're telling criminals just what they need to know to get in and out while you're not home. This also puts your neighbors at risk.


(6) Get to Know the Local Police Department

Get to know the local police department and express to them your desire to make your neighborhood safe. For example, if cars are often speeding through or someone walking up to houses you do not know, ask them to patrol the streets.

If you leave on vacation, many police departments have a vacation service where they will keep an eye on your property while you're away, at no charge. Just contact your local police department's office to ask about the program.


(7) Keep Your Things in Your Garage

Do not leave anything out in the yard or in your driveway. This can be anything from toys, yard tools or even leaving your car out. In past years, this might have been fine, but it only invites people to possibly try and take your things.

Caleb, our Fishing Guide at the IB Club, was able to attend a recent "West Bank" neighborhood meeting about the proposal and passed on some good information to the POA. He said about 50 people attended and mainly were opposed to the development.

According to Caleb's understanding, the developers plan to erect a 130-unit townhouse complex to meet the demand for middle-class homes in the RFV. He added that a hospice facility is also being considered, but as you can see on the 2017 link above patio homes and manufactured "tiny homes" were originally being proposed in addition to the townhomes.

Many people expressed concern about the lack of a plan to expand the intersection or the roads leading in, which could result in severe traffic congestion if 300–400 more people moved to this area. Additionally, Caleb worries that the overall quality of the development might be subpar and a blight on the surrounding neighborhoods. Sewage lines and their ability to handle the increased capacity were other concerns for those attending the meeting.

When more information is available on when it goes to the city, we will pass it along.




IRONBRIDGE REAL ESTATE MARKET UPDATE MARCH 2023


Ironbridge currently offers 14 homes for sale (compared to 11 last month), three homes are under contract, and one home sold over the past 30 days again!

The quaint 2 bedroom/ 2 bathroom 1,497 sf home on 282 Blue Heron Vista has been listed for \$815,000 and went under contract quickly within just 11 days. The additional home listed for sale this month is 91 River Bend Way, a spacious 4 bedroom/ 3 bathroom 2,744 sf home with terrific views of Mount Sopris, off of the 12th Fairway, offered at \$1,295,000.

Two of the new construction homes on Blue Heron Drive that had been under contract come back to the market again.

Very soon we will be able to welcome our newest neighbors at 303 Blue Heron Vista (scheduled to be completed July 2023) who closed on their home on March 20 -CONGRATULATIONS!!





Glenwood Springs has seen a total of 17 residential real estate closings over the past 30 days, compared to 27 over the same time period last year. The average price of \$761,294.00 included transactions ranging from \$195,000 for a 400 sf Brettelberg Condo up at Sunlight to a beautiful home up on No Name Creek which sold for \$1,800,000.00. Last year's average price per square foot was \$379. The total sales volume for the 30 day period is down approximately 36% this year compared to the same time period last year.

Most of the inventory currently available in Glenwood Springs is comprised of Single Family Homes. There are seven Condominiums and one Townhome offered for sale.

The Single Family Home inventory is approaching levels seen end of March 2020 and at the beginning of the pandemic, now equalling about two months of supply (as a reference, 5-6 months of inventory is often referenced when talking about a balanced real estate market).

And how about Carbondale including River Valley Ranch and Aspen Glen you might

wonder?

There are currently 43 homes offered for sale, at an average price of \$2,446,135 (\$761 per square foot), having been on the market for an average of 159 days.

Only four of these homes (including one mobile home) are available for under \$1 million.

17 of the 43 homes are new construction homes which are offered at an average price of \$2,972,146, having been on the market for an average of 218 days.

As mentioned above, Glenwood Springs carries two months of supply, Carbondale is a little higher, now steadily holding five months of supply since November 2022.

When did you start White House Pizza and how were the early days?

Kurt and Marla Korn moved to Carbondale to open White House in 1997 and are currently celebrating their 25th anniversary! The early days were challenging. The building was in need of repairs and we still had our original restaurant that was in Longmont. We spent the first couple of months fixing up the building and hiring staff. It was a

family affair and most of our immediate family pitched in helping to get us ready to open...including our mailman (Mel Paxton) from our Longmont location. We also got pregnant with our first child the month we opened...December 1997. The first two years were tough financially. Luckily we made just enough to keep the doors open until our reputation for good pizza started to turn things around.

How have the pizza-making techniques changed since you began?

Not much. We still use basically the same recipes except we have continually had to update our systems to accommodate the growth of the business without sacrificing quality

What message would you like to share with current customers and prospective customers alike about how to best enjoy the restaurant - do you take reservations, the best way to order for takeout, etc?

We always recommend dining in. We believe our menu items especially pizza are best eaten fresh from the oven.
