Great Blue Heron in the Roaring Fork Valley

The Roaring Fork River is a vital habitat for the great blue heron, particularly during their breeding season and until the fledglings can migrate south (mostly to Texas or Mexico) in late summer/early fall. Not all herons migrate; some may stay in areas with sufficient food and open water.

Great Blue Herons typically mate in early spring. They engage in courtship displays, which include synchronized flying and elaborate posturing. Great Blue Herons typically stay together for life. Pairs often return to the same nesting sites each year. Their nests are built in tall trees, and females lay between 2 and 6 eggs that incubate for about 30 days. The chicks will fledge (develop feathers) and begin to fly about 60 days after hatching.

If you float the Roaring Fork River, you can observe their largest rookery on the west bank in a group of tall trees approximately 1 mile upriver from the Carbondale bridge. There used to be a smaller rookery at Heron Point, but that cottonwood tree fell several years ago.



The Heron Point conservancy easement is on the east side of the river. It is the trees and green area along the river and below the bluff.

Our IBPOA owns approximately seven acres of conservation easement common area located southeast and across the river from the southern portion of the community's residences (referred to as Heron Point). It was put into an easement in December 1998 by Rose Ranch, for which it earned significant tax benefits. Heron Point was transferred to the IBPOA when it was created in 2001.

Sandwiched between the Cattle Creek Confluence Easement and the Roaring Fork River, the Heron Point Easement contributes to 1.25 continuous miles of riverside protection. Heron Point served its namesake by providing critical habitat and nesting sites for Great Blue Heron within the towering cottonwood stands before that tree fell down. Even without the rookery, this conservancy easement open space designation and restricted access are permanent.

Heron Point protects 6,865 feet of the Roaring Fork River (when combined with the Cattle Creek Confluence easement). There is no public access allowed to Heron Point. Roaring Fork Conservancy (RFC) monitors compliance with the easement terms to ensure that the conservancy's goals to preserve natural resources, wildlife habitat, and open spaces are achieved. The IBPOA pays RFC a quarterly stewardship fee.

The Harvest Roaring Fork community, with its proposed 1200 new residences with an estimated 5,000 new people, will be located directly adjacent to Heron Point. Trespassing by Harvest Roaring Fork community residences will be prohibited and our community will be responsible for assuring continued Heron Point's restricted access (e.g., placement & maintenance of fencing and signage).

IBPOA common area west and across the river from Heron Crossing are considered buffer zones. Several years ago, several Ironbridge members met with the RFC, and it was agreed that IBPOA members could have year-round access to the Heron Point buffer zone area.

Currently, we have a primitive river access trail in the Heron Point buffer zone (west side of river, across from Heron Point) that begins near to IBPOA's south pumphouse. To make this a better year-round trail, the River Committee is considering adding woodchips to that trail much like has been done on our Heron Crossing (north) river trail in the next year or so. As with all IBPOA common area owned along the river, our members can fish (*catch and release*) in this part of the river year-round. *Please use our river access trails to get to the river for fishing.*

IRONBRIDGE MARKET UPDATE

February 2026

Over the past ~35 days, **four homes closed in Ironbridge.**

And at the moment, **we have no active listings and none pending**—which is a pretty unique snapshot for our neighborhood.

Here are the four closings (I'll add links so you can click through for photos and full details):

- **1 Eagle Claw Circle** — Sold \$825,000
- **484 Red Bluff Vista** — Sold \$1,050,000
- **643 River Bend Way** — Sold \$1,050,000
- **354 Blue Heron Drive** — Sold \$1,500,000

What stands out

Even with strong values holding up, these closings still tell a familiar story for this season:

buyers are paying attention, but they're not rushing, and pricing still needs to be dialed in. In these four sales, the final numbers landed closer to the last asking price than the original list price—meaning price improvements during the listing period still mattered.

And of course, the headline: **no current inventory**. If you're a seller, that's worth paying attention to. If you're a buyer, it usually means you're waiting (or broadening your search).

Glenwood Springs: January snapshot

A quick look at Glenwood Springs shows a more “normal” market dynamic than Ironbridge:

- **Inventory is up** year-over-year
- **Days on market are up**, too
- **Average list price is up**, while **list price per square foot is down**

And when we look at January closings so far: **more homes sold than last January**, prices are up modestly, **but days on market are notably longer**, and sellers are **receiving a bit less of their original asking price** than a year ago.



Carbondale to Rifle: early-year sales pace

Zooming out to the broader corridor (Carbondale → Rifle), the year has started with steady activity and a familiar winter rhythm: **longer days on market**, pricing that's generally stable, and buyers still negotiating—especially when a home isn't perfectly positioned.

Nearby Neighborhoods: Inventory exists (unlike Ironbridge right now)

To contrast Ironbridge's "zero inventory" moment, here's what we see in a few comparable neighborhoods over the past ~35 days

Aspen Glen

- **306 Gold Bear Drive** sold on 1/6/26 for \$2,565,000, \$918 per square foot
- Pricing currently spans a wide range from \$1.8 - \$5.2 million
- **15 Homes are currently offered for sale** at a median price of \$3,400,000, with an average of 219 days on market.
- The price per square foot for the homes offered ranges from \$473 - \$1,315
- In comparison, 20 homes sold in Aspen Glen in 2025 at a median price of \$2,499,500, \$864 average per square foot, and after being 128 days on market

River Valley Ranch

- **1185 Heritage Drive** is the one home that sold so far this year. \$3,020,000, 90% of original asking price, \$544 per square foot, 220 days on market
- Pricing currently spans from \$2.8 - \$6.5 million

- **Eight homes are currently for sale** at a median price of \$4,195,000, \$962 average per square foot
- These homes have been on the market an average of 166 days so far, ranging from 21 days to 364 days
- Last year, 21 homes sold in RVR at a median price of \$2.4 million, \$783 average per square foot. It took an average of 107 days for these homes to sell last year

Pinyon Mesa

- **2026 has seen two sales** so far at \$1,562,500 average, \$520 per square foot. One of the homes sold after 239 days for 86% of the original asking price, while it took 90 days for the other home to sell at 94% of the asking price
- **Two homes are listed for sale** at a median price of \$1,562,000, \$579 per square foot, and an average of 151 days on market

Lakota Canyon Ranch

- **383 Faas Ranch Road** closed 01/16/2026 for \$920,000, with an original list of \$1,345,000 (about 68% of original list), cash. \$290 per square foot
- **8 Homes currently for sale** at a median price of \$936,000, \$459 per square foot. The homes have been on the market for 92 days on average.

Bottom line: those neighborhoods have options on the shelf. **Ironbridge currently doesn't**, which creates a very different dynamic for anyone trying to buy (or thinking about selling).


