STAY ON TOP OF IRONBRIDGE COMMUNITY RULES & REGULATIONS



RENTAL LEASES

Some homeowners have inquired about the rules surrounding rentals in Ironbridge. The Ironbridge IPOA Rules and Regulations state:

a. All rental leases are subject to the Covenants and Rules and Regulations of the Association. Any failure to comply with the above will be a default under the lease.

Owners are responsible for giving tenants a copy of the rules and regulations, and for notifying the Association with names and phone numbers of new tenants.

- b. Occupancy of each dwelling unit on the Property shall be limited to no more than two principal adults and the legal dependents of one or both of said principal adults, and occasional guests.
- c. Leases must be in writing and for a term of no less than 6 months. Rental use as a VRBO or Air BNB are not permitted. (Per Garfield County, short term rentals are not permitted in a PUD).

SPEEDING

Spring has sprung, summer is right around the corner and the kids will be out of school soon. That means there will be much more activity on our streets...children, dogs, bicycles, scooters, walkers, runners, etc. It is very important for every driver to obey the speed limit and to be aware of who is sharing the road.

SPEED LIMIT 17

RIVER COMMITTEE

River Access Trail #3 - Update

April 27, 2023 IPOA and Roaring Fork Conservancy (RFC) Meeting. Participants: Rick Lofaro, RFC Executive Director, and Jeff Kelley, Rick Moore and John Chapman, IPOA Members

<u>IPOA River Access Trail #3:</u> We agreed that Ironbridge POA (IPOA) can create a primitive year-round trail that enters the Great Blue Heron Reserve buffer zone, which is not encumbered by the RFC conservation easement that was designated by Rose Ranch/Ironbridge. This trail will start just south of the IPOA's irrigation pump house.

The trail would not exceed a width of 48" with minimal intrusion to the soil. The IPOA will align the trail to minimize the removal of existing vegetation. The IPOA will use wood chips as a surface material, preferably from dead native trees (e.g., aspens, cottonwoods, pine). The trail will go approximately 100' in a southern direction before turning back north along an escarpment well above the 100-year flood plain and well outside of the 35' setback within the riparian protection zone. This proposed primitive trail will then end at two existing river access points (existing game trails that lead to the river). Some fallen timbers at one of these two access points, that we believe are a safety issue, will be removed.

The trail alignment and pathway will be subject to Rick Lofaro's on-site inspection and approval. In advance of the RFC trail assessment, we have marked our proposed primitive trail pathway with blue survey flags. We hope to accomplish this inspection in late May/early June 2023. NOTE: We walked the area near this proposed trail with Lofaro in March 2022, and were able to show Lofaro our proposed path on our IPOA Plat Map at our April 27th meeting.

Next Steps: We will update IPOA Members that the final trail has been marked with blue survey flags. You are more than welcome to see what we currently have marked.

Our ability to create this trail is subject to your involvement, if you'd like to help build this trail please contact John Chapman at john.chapman03@hotmail.com. Future details on our target build date and construction details will be included in future IPOA newsletters.

February 15 to July 15 Access Restrictions No Longer Apply: We agreed that the Great Blue Heron Reserve buffer zone access restrictions no longer apply and such signage can be removed. The 2003 IPOA PUD filing Section 18 regarding such access restrictions were deleted via a subsequent PUD amendment. Per Lofaro, the Great Blue Heron Reserve buffer zone has no other access restrictions since the heron colony has migrated upstream.

Next Step: The current sign that restricts access between February 15 to July 15th will be replaced with a "River Access Trail for IPOA Members Only" sign when we build River Access Trail #3.



River Committee Vision Statement:

With the consent of our IPOA Board, The Club, Garfield County, and the Roaring Fork Conservancy, our IPOA River Committee has been enhancing and building new river access trails for your use and enjoyment.

- Created River Access Trail #1 in the Heron Crossing (Phase 3), in the northern (downriver) Ironbridge area, which we hope to eventually extend to CR 109;
- Improved River Access Trail #2 at the River Bank Lane pump house, in the central Ironbridge area; and
- Planned for River Access Trail #3 at the South pump house, in the southern Ironbridge area with access to allow IPOA Member access to what is described as "the beach" and existing primitive animal trails by the river.

In addition, our volunteers continue to perform much-needed riverside maintenance including (i) removing a large number of invasive plants (e.g., Russian olives, tamarisk, and Canada thistle) along the river, and (ii) adding "No Trespassing" signs along the river (i.e., applicable to non-IPOA members).

By providing our IPOA members with these established trails and continuing with river maintenance we hope to:

- Create a safe and environmentally appropriate IPOA members' access to the Roaring Fork River; and
- Eliminate "bandit" river access trails across private property and within the riparian and wetlands zones.

FLYING M RANCH UPDATE



Help stop 2,000 more car and truck trips per day from Flying M Ranch Development near Riverview Elementary School by attending June 28th 6pm meeting with Garfield County Planning Commission. This development of 154 townhomes and several businesses adjacent to Riverview School will further add 2,000 more vehicle trips per day to the intersection by the school as well as County Road 154 and Highway 82 intersection. By either attending this meeting to voice your concerns about this during the public comment period and/or writing your comments by June 16th to the County Planner John Leybourne (jleybourne@garfield-county.com) they will be included in the package that goes to each and every member of the Planning Commission before they vote on this project. If built this project will likely have big impacts on the quality of life of each and every household here in Ironbridge so this is an opportunity to let your voice be heard. Strawberry Days is the oldest, continuously held civic celebration west of the Mississippi. Held annually in mid-June since 1898, Strawberry Days has grown into a week-long celebration culminating each year with a packed weekend of entertainment, artisans, a parade, and of course free strawberries and ice cream for one and all.

The festival started as a marketing effort to promote the fruit growers in the Roaring Fork and Grand River Valleys. Juicy, delicious, and prolific during the month of June, the strawberry was selected as the festival's featured crop. Local newspapers helped spread the word far and wide, even inviting Governor Alva Adams to attend. The railroads also promoted the festival, offering special rates to local miners and their families. The highlight of the event was the serving of generous portions of homemade cake topped with strawberries and fresh cream. The tradition lives on as the **Glenwood Springs Chamber Resort Association** and the local **Kiwanis Club** dish strawberries and ice cream to thousands of festival goers each year after the parade.



IRONBRIDGE REAL ESTATE MARKET UPDATE JUNE 2023



Ironbridge has seen some good real estate activity over the past 30 days.

Three existing homes at an average list price of \$1,053,000/\$383.00 per square foot are currently under contract having been on the market for less than 30 days. You are right if you are wondering about the slightly lower persquare footage price. 69 Bentgrass Drive has been advertised as a 4,064 square foot home, while 2,002 square feet of the home are comprised of an unfinished basement, listed at \$1.195 million.

Three additional homes including one new construction home have sold since our last newsletter at a very similar average price of \$1,083,609/\$454.00 per square foot. These homes were on the market for an average of

107 days achieving 105% of the asking price.

How do these activities compare to last year? We saw only one transaction here in Ironbridge

between the end of April and the end of May in 2022.

Our newest neighbors closed on their homes located at 282 Blue Heron Vista and 595 River Bend Way. The third home that has been closed on is the new construction project on 162 Blue Heron Drive — CONGRATULATIONS & WELCOME!

"Not accounted for in the Ironbridge Inventory graphic is the latest home for sale - a beautiful 2020 custom build 4,518 square foot residence on River Bank Lane featuring anything you can ask for, including a backyard gently sloping down to the river, offered at \$2,600,000 as of May 26."

Glenwood Springs has seen a total of 22 residential real estate closings over the past 30 days, compared to 25 over the same time period last year, and 36 sold residential properties in 2021.

The average price of \$883,217.00 (\$416/sf) is up from the same time period last year which averaged at \$783,237.00 (\$373/sf) and from 2021 at \$800,712.00 (\$387/sf).

It took an average of 84 days last year for these properties to sell and 78 days in 2021. What's probably not surprising is that lower priced properties last month sold within only 26 days while the highest priced homes (new construction in Ironbridge, home at 4-Mile Road, etc.) took an average of 221 days to sell.





Home sales in Glenwood Springs continue to outstrip supply and the Market Action Index has been moving higher for several weeks. This continues to be a Seller's market so watch for upward pricing pressure in the near future if the trend continues.

Glenwood Springs currently carries about 2.2 "Months of Supply", versus 3.4 in March of 2020, and when inventory reached another brief "high" in August of 2022 at 3.1 (as a reference point - inventory levels of 5-6 "Months of Supply" is one of the indicators of a balanced real estate market)

How does the inventory measure "Months of Supply" in Glenwood compare to our other local towns? Aspen is hovering between 7-8 since September of last year, with its highest level of

18 in May of 2020. Basalt carries about 3 "Months of Supply", Carbondale 5, and none of the towns West of Glenwood Springs carry more than 2 "Months of Supply" with Battlement Mesa at the lowest level at only 1.
