### IB POA BOARD UPDATE



Now that the leaves are falling, the wildlife fences are going up, and there's morning frost on the grass, we know we're definitely into Fall with a touch of Winter coming. Your Board is busy with these year-end projects:

- Squeezing in as much of the road repairs as possible before the snow flies.
- Renewing the snow removal contract with Good Earth
- Working on the operating and reserve budgets for 2026. This includes the decision on POA dues
- Preparing for the Annual Members Meeting - Monday, December 8th. We hope to see all of you there - watch for your meeting pack in regular mail

We will be informing you about things that have been accomplished and things planned for next year. It's a great time to have a broader discussion with neighbors and to have questions answered. Details will be coming soon on the time and location of the Annual Meeting.

Lastly, a comment about **Design Review**: It has been one of the more challenging aspects of governance. We have some new DR volunteers, and the process has gone through positive changes, with the Exec Board becoming more involved.

There have been a few instances of residents proceeding with their projects without Design Review approval. These actions cannot continue and will be subject to fines and potentially returning the project to its original state, which could be costly to homeowners. Please respect the process, familiarize yourself, and "play fair", following the rules like most other homeowners. Pleading ignorance will not work. Go to the website [www.ironbridgepoa.com](http://www.ironbridgepoa.com), the page for Design Review Guidelines. These were put in place to be reasonable, consistent, and to achieve an attractive community.

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There will be two possible openings for Board Member positions whose terms are expiring. We need candidates with:

- A passion for our community and an interest in working on a team to properly manage the association.
- Great Ideas to improve where and how we live.
- An understanding of our POA structure and relationship with the Club.

Volunteers for the Board attend one board meeting each month, communicate with residents and the property manager via email, periodically meet with Club management, and occasionally work on projects.

*(Section 4.2 Terms of Office. Terms of the Directors shall be two years and shall be staggered as follows. The term of at least one of the Directors shall expire annually, and at each annual meeting thereafter the members shall elect the same number of directors whose terms are expiring at the time of each election. No director may serve more than two (2) full consecutive terms unless no nominations are received or until the Executive Board can find a replacement. Upon serving two full consecutive terms, a director may not run for election for a period of one (1) year.)*

A community needs member involvement and fresh ideas to enhance the quality of our neighborhood.

The election of Board members will take place at the annual member meeting in early December.

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## RECYCLING

### Waste Management Recycling Guidelines

Recycling is one of the easiest and most effective ways to keep our community beautiful and sustainable. By following Waste Management's recycling guidelines, we can reduce landfill waste, conserve natural resources, and protect the environment we all enjoy. Let's work together to recycle responsibly and keep our neighborhood sustainable for years to come.

#### What Goes in the Recycling Bin

**Paper & Cardboard:** Newspapers, magazines, office

paper, clean cardboard boxes, and paper bags.  
(Please flatten boxes to save space.) \

**Plastic Containers:** Bottles, jugs, and tubs labeled with recycling symbols #1–#7. Make sure they're empty, clean, and dry.

**Metal Cans:** Aluminum, tin, and steel cans — rinse to remove food residue.

**Glass:** Bottles and jars of all colors (remove lids and rinse).

## What Stays Out

Avoid “wish-cycling” — placing non-recyclables in the bin hoping they’ll be recycled. These items cause contamination and damage equipment:

- Plastic bags, film, or wrap
- Food waste and liquids
- Styrofoam or takeout containers
- Electronics, batteries, and light bulbs
- Garden hoses, cords, or textiles



## Simple Recycling Tips

- Keep it loose: Do not bag recyclables; place them directly in the bin.
- When in doubt, throw it out: If you’re unsure, it’s better to trash it than contaminate the recycling stream.
- Break down boxes: Flatten cardboard to make room for everyone’s recyclables.

## Why It Matters

Contaminated recycling increases costs and reduces the efficiency of recycling programs. By taking a few extra moments to rinse containers and check labels, we all help make recycling more effective — and our community cleaner and greener.

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## Keep Your Dogs Leashed for Everyone’s Safety

Did you know that we have an Actor living in Ironbridge? Meet Beth Malone, who has a long history with our beautiful Valley. ## Ironbridge Market Update

November 2025

**Inventory in Ironbridge** remains tight at four active listings (and no new pendings or sales in the past 30 days), keeping buyer choice limited heading into late fall. The current set spans single-level convenience to new-construction scale, with list prices \$875,000–\$1,675,000 and list-price-per-foot ranging roughly \$489–\$632/sf.

Status note: Ironbridge shows 4 active / 0 pending / 0 sold in the current set of neighborhood listings and stats—an unusually quiet stretch that concentrates attention on quality

## Glenwood Springs Snapshot (Altos Market Research)

Glenwood Springs remains in a slight seller's advantage with a Market Action Index of 37, inventory at 46, and a median list price of \$1.524M. Prices and price-per-foot are essentially on a plateau, while inventory has drifted lower in recent weeks.

- Median List Price: \$1,524,500
- Per SqFt: ~\$503
- Avg/Median DOM: 103 / 77
- Price Decreases: ~50% of listings
- Inventory: 46
- MAI: 37 (slight seller's advantage)

**What it means for Ironbridge.** Glenwood is on a **price plateau** with **inventory easing in recent weeks**, which mirrors Ironbridge's quiet month: buyers are active but selective, rewarding move-in readiness, outdoor living value, and flexible layouts.

## Regional Snapshot: Carbondale → Rifle

Across the corridor this fall, headline metrics still show solid pricing and measured absorption. The theme: buyers are taking their time, and new listings are the swing factor town-by-town.



● 2025 ● 2024



inventory stems more from additional listings coming to market rather than a collapse in buyer activity. New pendings are broadly in line with prior years, which supports the “more to choose from” narrative rather than “no one is buying.” If inventory stays elevated into winter while MAI holds ~30, expect firmer negotiation ranges and greater importance on pricing precision.

Your year-over-year context (rolling 12 months, single-family in Rifle):

- Closed units: 106 vs 125 a year ago (modest decline)
- Dollar volume: \$61M vs \$68M last year
- Months of supply: ~7 at the end of September vs ~2 last year (first time reaching a clearly balanced level)

Interpretation. It’s too early to call a trend, but the data suggest the increase in

## Closing Thoughts

- Ironbridge: Low inventory and no new pendings/sales in the last month keep the focus on the four active homes. Expect buyer diligence on condition, outdoor space, and flexible floor plans.
- Glenwood Springs: Still a slight seller’s market with stable pricing and easing inventory.
- Valley-wide: The story to watch is Rifle, where months of supply finally hit balanced territory—more selection without a dramatic pullback in demand.
